Epsom Common Day

As you doubtless already know, we chose the one day of seriously bad weather this summer for Epsom Common Day 2018, so were forced to cancel the event; the wind would have made going ahead potentially dangerous. This was of course very disappointing, but we set about salvaging what we could. Despite them incurring considerable trouble and expense, our suppliers and performers have been incredibly generous in giving us refunds, or credits for an event next year. We are very grateful for their kindness. We were also able to defray expenses by keeping materials for next year, or selling them on. The upshot is that taking the funds remaining or recovered together with the credits gives us a budget for another Common Day of about £3500. This is the same as our fund raising target for this year's event; in the end we raised rather more, although that also had to cover the cost of the crowd funding.

The committee have therefore decided that we have sufficient funds to organise another Common Day, without the need for further fund raising. Given that many individuals and organisations donated money to us specifically to stage a Common Day, we clearly have an obligation to do so. We therefore agreed that, weather permitting, we will hold a Common Day in 2019. The date is yet to be decided; we need to ensure certain performers are available and avoid major events such as the Wimbledon and Cricket Word Cup finals. However we intend to have the date settled and announced within a few weeks.

With the experience gained this year, and more time to organise, we hope to be able to arrange an event that will be even better than this year's would have been, had the weather allowed. Let's hope for better weather next year.

Public Consultations

We have recently been invited to attend two consultations concerning the future of Epsom. One is a "Future40" event organised by the Borough Council seeking "to develop a long term vision for the borough." The second is a forum organised by Chris Grayling MP to discuss the pressure for additional housing and the services that would need. We intend to send a representative to both. We will try to ensure that the importance of the Common, both to the natural world and the people of Epsom, is recognised. We will also explain that the long term health of the Common requires that many of the neighbouring green spaces are preserved.

Given that the objectives of the ECA solely concern the Common, and that we have no idea of your opinions on more general development in Epsom, we should probably be cautious in expressing views on issues that will not affect the Common. We will let you know of anything significant we learn. Although by the time you read this at least one of the consultations will have taken place, we would welcome your opinions on the matter. Neither the demand for housing nor the pressure from government to build more in Epsom than the Council have planned are about to go away.

- October Great Pond on Sunday 21st and Monday 22nd We'll be cutting back small trees from the pond margins to improve the habitat for wading birds.
- November Christ Church Glade on Sunday 18th and Monday 19th We'll be clearing scrub and small trees from around the Scots Pines, which are roosts for birds of prey.

Our charcoal production has restarted. Apologies to any disappointed customers who were unable to buy our lumpwood charcoal, as we were prevented from having any burns in July and August due to the tinder dry conditions on the common. We hope to build up our stock in the next few months. For all you gardeners, we do have charcoal fines in stock. These have proved to be a great water retaining additive for container and pot compost during the dry weather. The small pieces of charcoal have a myriad of tiny holes throughout and these all retain water thus keeping the compost moist. Just add a handful of fines to your regular container compost. A £3.00 bag is ridiculously cheap and goes a long way. Available at The Lower Mole Trust, 2 West Park

Cattle Grazing

The Cattle Grazing project is now well established and has again been a great success; this year we hosted 20 animals between the end of May and the end of September. The herd was comprised of Angus, Belted Galloway, Dexter and Shorthorn breeds. Despite extremes of weather – first the Beast from the East to delay the start of Spring, followed by a record prolonged heat wave and drought - they thrived and did a good job of managing the pasture areas by restricting the development of scrub, thereby encouraging diversity in these areas.
